## A New Year Full of Promise

This issue of *Insulation Outlook* is full of news of the promise a new year brings. First, David Tomchak, Chair of NIA's Metal Building Laminator Committee, walks us through the new-and-improved NIA-Certified Faced Insulation Standard for metal building insulation (page 8). Next, Bill Beals explains the most recent commercial energy code cycle (IECC 2021/ASHRAE 90.1-2019), focusing on what has changed and what you need to know to make sure your projects meet the latest requirements (page 14). At the top of the list (or perhaps tied with the launch of NIA's Education Center) is the upcoming Industry Measurement Survey. Conducted every 2 years by an independent, thirdparty company, and funded by the Foundation, the survey captures data on the size of the insulation industry, as well as industry growth trends. This year's survey will collect a wider range of information than in previous years, allowing us to learn more about the market share for different product groups and separate estimates for the commercial and industrial markets, as well as other trends. Check out the article to learn more about the survey and other Foundation developments.

Finally, I urge everyone to read Rick Rinehart's important and timely article, "Suicide and Opioid Overdose: Prevention Starts with Reducing Stigma," beginning on page 28. Our industry suffers disproportionately from the effects of both, and they affect so many individuals and families. Rick is Deputy Director of the Center for Construction Research and Training, and he spoke at our Fall Summit on how we need to remove the stigma and address mental health issues.
