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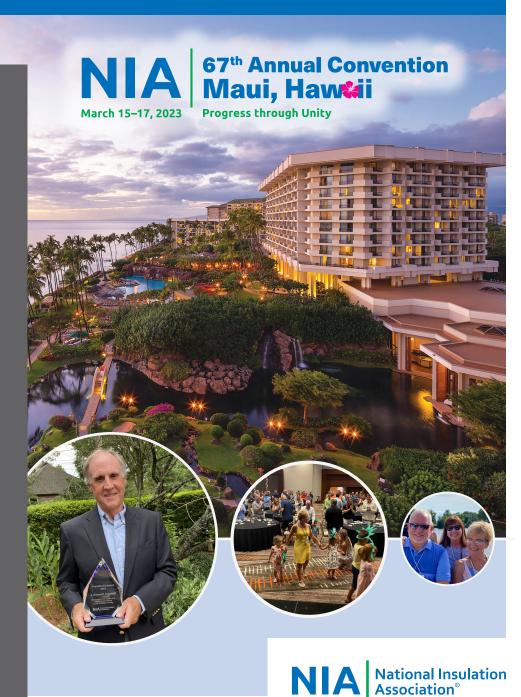
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EVP/CEO MESSAGE

NIA Past President Kenny Freeman Honored

with the Prestigious NIA President's Award by Outgoing President Joe Leo



In conjunction with NIA's recent Annual Convention in Maui, 2022-2023 NIA President Joe Leo surprised NIA Past President Kenny Freeman of Petrin, LLC by presenting him with the NIA President's Award. This high honor is not an annual award, but rather is given at the discretion of the NIA President to an individual who has demonstrated outstanding service and dedication to NIA, resulting in accomplishments that have tremendous benefits for the association and the industry.

Deep NIA and Industry Roots

Kenny served as NIA President from 2015 to 2016, having been a member of NIA's Board of Directors for many years. He was one of Joe Leo's Past President Advisors, offering his counsel and insights to Joe as well as several other NIA Presidents. A member of NIA's Long-Range Planning Committee, Kenny has also been a leader and member of the Merit Contractors Committee and a Founding Member of the Foundation for Mechanical Insulation Education, Training, and Industry Advancement. He took a key role in helping launch the Young Professional Advisory Committee and was instrumental in updating NIA's insulation installation video series and upgrading the NIA website. In addition, Kenny served as President of the Southwest Insulation Contractors Association (SWICA) from 2002 to 2004 and received the SWICA President's Legacy Award in 2018.

In presenting the NIA President's Award on March 16, 2023, Joe noted, "I have watched and admired this man throughout my involvement with NIA. He is a well-respected contractor and just an amazing human being. The more I got to know him, the more I respected his work ethic and dedication to all he does. He is a role model to so many and has dedicated his life to helping others."

Kenny graduated from Louisiana State University (LSU) in 1980 and went to work for an industrial construction firm from 1980 to 1984. In 1984, he began working for Petrin, LLC. He started as a timekeeper at one of the industrial plants and, over the years, he worked his way up through the ranks and eventually purchased the company, which he owned until it was sold in 2015.

- Past President of Associated Builders & Contractors, Pelican Chapter, and current chapter member;
- Former Board of Directors member currently active in the Greater Baton Rouge Industry Alliance Council;

- President of The Palms of Perdido Homeowners Association in Florida since 2019;
- Coach, along with his son John, of the Catholic High School (CHS) 8th grade basketball team for 21 years—the longest running span of any coach in the league;
- Official clock operator for all CHS varsity home basketball games for 15 years;
- Member of the Louisiana Chemical Industry Alliance;
- Host of his own podcast, The Freeman Report, an uncensored discussion on various topics and individuals that are making a difference; and
- LSU football season ticket holder since 1980.

In accepting the honor, Kenny shared, "I just love this industry... the better it becomes, the better we become. You get out of it truly—what you put into it. I've gotten a tremendous, tremendous return on being part of NIA, and this award is truly an honor."

The **Associates Committee** welcomed a panel of engineers for an Ask-an-Engineer session with Jason Harris, CTC, Coatings/Insulation/Refractory, Chevron; and Michael Pardo, Non-Metallic Engineering Specialist, Coatings, Insulation, & Fireproofing Subject Matter Expert, S&B Engineers and Constructors. Johns Manville's Scott Sinclair moderated the session, which generated a great dialogue among attendees and presenters. The committee reviewed and discussed the Premier Industry Manufacturer Award to determine if any opportunities needed to be eliminated or added, and the Chair challenged all companies to sign up to participate in this free program. Distributors/Fabricators Committee attendees heard from Stephen Sasaki, President and Owner, SACK Defense LLC, on the topic of Building an Effective Team.

The **Education and Training Committee** discussed future courses and topics for NIA's Education Center, as well as possible new sponsorship opportunities for the microlearning platform. The committee received an update on hosted courses and partner presentations for the Thermal Insulation Inspector Certification™ Program.

The **Health and Safety Committee** heard from Bradley Shields from the Hawaii Occupational Safety and Health Division Department of Labor and Industrial Relations on the latest OSHA heat stress regulations and more health and safety matters coming down the pipeline. NIA Legal Counsel Gary Auman provided an overview of OSHA updates on various topics, including egregious violations policy, instance-by-instance inspections, recordkeeping, and heat stress. The committee discussed updates to the Safety Excellence Awards for the coming year, as well as potential topics for the Fall Summit meeting such as fall protection, helmet demonstrations, and personal protective equipment.

The **Membership Committee** focused on efforts to create innovative ways to engage new members and first-time attendees, brainstormed recruitment and retention efforts, and considered how to address the needs of small contractors.

The Merit Contractors Committee spent time in a roundtable discussion on regional updates regarding backlogs, expedited projects, delayed projects, and staffing issues. In addition, attendees discussed the value a new safety manual could bring to contractors. The group welcomed Stephen Sasaki of SACK Defense LLC, who shared insights on building effective teams.

The Metal Building Laminators Committee has completed its update to the NIA Certified Faced Insulation Standard 404.1-2022. A downloadable PDF of the new standard has also been finalized and is available at https://tinyurl.com/2knbjbyx. In response to a request by the Technical Information Committee, the committee will be working on a jacketing specifications chart.

The Technical Information Committee (TIC) continued its work on two new specification charts for jacketing and sealants/mastics. The committee determined that staff will create web pages for the Guide to Insulation Product Specifications. The glossary is already available. All of the documents the TIC regularly updates will continue to be PDFs available online. The committee created a new granular definition with subcategories for rigid and flexible materials, and this update will be made on the product specifications chart and in the Design Guide. TIC members also volunteered to review any new educational courses created over the spring and summer.

The Union Contractors were pleased to welcome leadership from the International Association of Heat and Frost Insulators and Allied Workers General President Terrence M. Larkin and General Secretary Treasurer Robert W. Reap for extremely productive and interactive discussions.

The Young Professional Advisory Committee (YPAC) heard a presentation on negotiating without fear from Dr. Victoria Medvec. Attendees received updates on the latest NIA Board initiatives, as well as from each of the YPAC's three task forces, including diversity and inclusion, the mentor program, and outreach to engineering students.

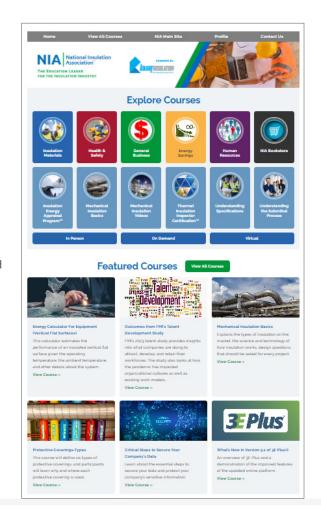

Safety Corner

New OSHA Developments Regarding Heat Illness Prevention and Instance-by-Instance Penalties

When narrowing down the topics for this column, I had three ideas on what to cover. Then, as often happens in the area of safety and safety compliance, the Occupational Safety and Health Review Commission (OSHRC) issued a decision in five cases against the United States Postal Service (USPS) alleging General Duty Clause violations involving heat illness prevention. Since we are heading into the warmer summer season in most of the country, I felt that the OSHRC decision needed to be communicated to NIA's members.

The General Duty Clause requires employers to provide a place of employment for their employees that is free from recognized hazards that cause or are likely to cause death or serious physical harm to their employees. As most of you are aware, the General Duty Clause is currently used by OSHA to ensure that employees are protected from the adverse effects of working in a high heat index environment while the agency is working to develop a standard to set out specific rules to accomplish this mission. For the last several years, employers have had to do the best they can and guess what OSHA expects them to do to protect their employees. I say "guess" at what OSHA expects because without a standard, we have no firm requirements or guidelines as to what must be done.

Over the years, primarily through litigation, the OSHRC and the federal appellate courts have indicated that employers must take feasible steps to protect their employees as stated by the General Duty Clause. Part of the problem here is that there is no real "set" definition of what is considered to be feasible. Quite a few years ago, OSHA indicated that any steps that would be technically feasible need to be taken, and that economic feasibility does not enter into the equation. Several interesting points have come out of this recent decision by the OSHRC that may challenge the feasibility consideration.

First, understand that the term "feasible" does not appear anywhere in the General Duty Clause. Therefore, the feasibility issue is something created by OSHA and reviewed and further defined by the OSHRC in the federal appellate courts in the five cases before the OSHRC Administrative Law Judge (ALJ). ALJ Sharon D. Calhoun heard the cases separately and vacated the General Duty Clause violations in all five cases. ALJ Calhoun rendered a separate decision in each case. The OSHRC combined all five cases—each one arising in a different geographic area of the country—and affirmed ALI Calhoun's decision in the five cases, but also affirmed the citation in one case. The decision of the OSHRC gets into substantial detail in analyzing ALJ Calhoun's decision. There was a considerable amount of discussion as to whether OSHA had or had not proved that the employees in all five cases were exposed to an excessive heat hazard. I will save the opportunity to elaborate on that discussion by the OSHRC for a future article. What I would like to do here is comment on the reason the OSHRC vacated the General Duty Clause citation in the five cases.

To summarize the decision of the OSHRC in just a few words, it appears that the OSHRC looked at both technical and economic feasibility with regards to the steps OSHA felt the USPS should take to protect employees from the high heat index exposure hazards. In light of this OSHRC decision, from the employer perspective, I feel that you still have received very little guidance from OSHA that you can rely on when developing your heat illness prevention program. I also feel that the OSHRC decision provides an indication that, until we see a specific standard, we cannot operate on a one-size-fits-all approach for heat illness prevention. Contractors are aware of the impact a serious OSHA citation may have on their ability to bid work. There is case law that indicates that a General Duty Clause citation must be cited as serious and cannot be negotiated to a lesser classification, such as Other Than Serious, in any effort to settle out the citation. Therefore, the best approach is to take whatever steps are necessary to develop a solid heat illness prevention program that will stand the feasibility test against which it might be measured by OSHA.

Another interesting OSHA development in recent months arises from a memorandum to Regional Administrators dated January 26, 2023, from Kimberly A. Stille, the Director of Enforcement Programs. This memorandum was designed to provide guidance to Regional and Area Offices "when issuing instance-by-instance (IBI) citations for high-gravity serious violations of OSHA standards specific to

falls, trenching, machine guarding, respiratory protection, permit-required confined spaces, lockout tagout, and other-than-serious violations of OSHA standards specific to recordkeeping." The original policy for IBI citations originated in 1990. It has become known as citations for egregious violations. These citations were issued only when the Area Director determined that the employer should be cited for a willful violation. Stille's memorandum is intended to expand the IBI policy to "incentivize employers to proactively prevent workplace fatalities and injuries and provide OSHA another tool to use on its mission to ensure safe and healthful working conditions for America's workforce."

The original IBI policy was used as indicated and resulted in separate violations or citations issued to employers for each employee exposed to the hazard created by the willful violation. If the IBI policy is now applied beyond willful violations to serious violations of the hazards identified above, it appears that employers will be exposed to separate violations for each employee who was exposed to a serious violation in any of the areas identified above. For NIA's contractor members, this would appear to focus on fall protection, permit-required confined space compliance, and respiratory protection issues. In addition, some contractors may also find themselves confronted with trenching, machine guarding, and lockout tagout compliance issues, as well as potential other-thanserious citations for recordkeeping violations.

I pass this information on to urge you to review your current programs in the areas impacted by this memorandum and to be sure that the programs you have in these areas establish solid requirements for your employees to follow to protect themselves from the identified hazards. Also, you MUST be sure you are able to demonstrate that you are taking all available steps to ensure that your employees are complying with the rules you have established. The new OSHA policy outlined in the January 26 memo is now in effect.
